#### PROGRAM NOTE

I liken him to a kind of star, or a comet that fell through the sky, and everybody talks about it yet today. — Julie Harris

He seems to capture that moment of youth, . . . where we're all desperately seeking to find ourselves. —Dennis Hopper

He is not our hero because he was perfect, but because he perfectly represented the damaged but beautiful soul of our time. —Andy Warhol

James Byron Dean (1931-1955) experienced the brightest and briefest movie career ever. In sixteen months he made three movies: East of Eden, Rebel Without a Cause, and Giant. Only the first had been released when he was killed in a car accident at the age of 24. His death, on September 30, 1955, sparked an unparalleled outpouring of sorrow. For three years thereafter, Warner Brothers received more letters to him than to any living actor. Thousands still travel to the small town of Fairmount, Indiana, to see the farm where he grew up and to visit his grave. His familiar image appears worldwide on posters and T-shirts. He has been the subject of many books, songs, television documentaries, plays, movies, and hundreds of magazine articles. More than forty years after his death, James Dean is still a hero to his own and to succeeding generations who keep his legend alive.

A bronze bust of James Dean by artist Kenneth Kendall stands near Griffith Park Observatory in Los Angeles. A Greek inscription appears on the right shoulder:

#### ΘΕΡΕΟΣ ΝΕΟΝ ΙΣΤΑΜΕΝΟΙΟ

The inscription translates "As summer was just beginning." This sentiment, from a painting by John La Farge, is a Greek epitaph lamenting the premature death of a young person. I chose it as the title for this piece.

The main melody is loosely based on a traditional folksong from the British Isles, "The Winter it is past, and the Summer's here at last." I chose it because Dean's Quaker heritage is rooted in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and because this simple bittersweet song about summer seemed appropriate for remembering James Dean.

#### PERFORMANCE NOTE

The style of the piece is *sostenuto* and *cantabile*. A forward-moving, effortless song-like feeling is desired. Observation of the metronome marking of 72 to the quarter should keep the piece from becoming too slow. The *a tempos* at measures 25, 33, and 49 may be performed *poco piu mosso* if desired. In fact, the piece may be performed with greater *rubato* than indicated by the score. The performers are invited to add their own intuition and musical judgment to the performance.
